# Tallinn Healthcare College internationalisation strategy 2019-2021

Tallinn Healthcare College (hereinafter *College*) internationalisation strategy (hereinafter *strategy*) proceeds from <u>higher education programme 2017-2020</u>, <u>vocational education programme 2016-2019</u>, <u>Estonian lifelong learning strategy</u>, <u>study programme group quality assessment decision</u>, <u>College statutes</u>, <u>development plan 2017-2021</u> and the College's structural units' development plans.

The strategy determines the College's main objectives, directions and key activities from the aspect of study, research and development internationalisation, based on professional and higher education general objectives provided both on national and European level.

1. General objective of European professional and higher education internationalisation

The most important indicator of the development of a common European education space is students' mobility and academic staff's participation in international research and development activities and teaching. Pupil and student exchange expands the participants understanding of the world, enhances the possibilities of the home higher education institution's curriculum and prepares graduates for competition on an international labour market. The College supports learners' mobility to the extent provided in the development plan. The objective set for European education is that by 2020, 20% of graduates will have gained mobility experience.

2. General objectives of Estonian professional and higher education internationalisation

One of the objectives of the Estonian professional and higher education policy is to increase the share of foreign students studying in Estonia and Estonian learners' short-term study mobility (Higher education programme 2017-2020). Estonian professional education policy aims to increase student and teacher mobility and participation of schools in international cooperation (Professional education programme 2016-2019). Internationalisation must support the Estonian economy's areas of growth, by preparing the necessary specialists and supporting education quality.

3. General objectives of the College's professional and higher education's internationalisation

The objective of the strategy is to establish a framework to carry out internationalisation in the College's development plan planned activities:

- Staff internationalisation
- Learners` internationalisation

#### • International research and development

Choice of international cooperation target countries and regions proceeds from priorities set by the European Commission. National and global foreign programmes and the College's budgetary means are used to carry out internationalisation.

Objective: College staff are internationally active in research and development and studies.
